MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Peace and all good!

May is the Month of Mary — and maybe, like me, you just can't resist a good Mariological controversy. Or maybe you can.

In any event, perhaps you heard that Pope Francis lately stirred up a bit of debate when he declared that Mary is not Co-Redemptrix with Christ.

If you haven't heard this term, Co-Redemptrix is a "title used to describe Mary's relation to Jesus and her unique role in salvation history... the prefix 'co-' ordinarily means a mutually cooperative effort between or among equals... it applies to one who both cooperates with, and is completely dependent on and subordinate to, another or others. It is in this sense in which Mary may be said to cooperate with her Son, the sole redeemer of humanity" (p. 72, *Encyclopedia of Mary* by Monica & Bill Dodds — 2007, Our Sunday Visitor).

Speaking on the Vigil of the Solemnity of the Annunciation, Pope Francis said he entrusts the Church to Mary — but he was very specific that he did so "as a Mother, not as a goddess, not as co-redeemer: as mother. It is true that Christian piety has always given her beautiful titles, as a child gives to his or her mamma," said the pope. "But we need to be careful: the things the Church, the saints, say about her, beautiful things, about Mary, subtract nothing from Christ's sole Redemption. He is the only Redeemer."

So did Pope Francis just dis Mary?

No, he didn't. While some have sought to have the concept of Co-Redemptrix defined as dogma, it never has been — so it just remains a lovely title to ascribe to Mary.

It is a concept and a title, however, that points to a very deep truth, which is this: God wants — indeed, needs — us to participate in our own salvation.

Since we are endowed with a free will, God will not force anything on us, however much it might be for our ultimate good.

No, we must come to faith on our own — with open hearts and hands; hearts ready to be filled with the love of God, and hands ready to receive the gift of eternal life.

God needed Mary to say yes — and she did. “Let it be done unto me according to your word” (Luke 1:38). Nothing was imposed upon her; her assent was a sign of participation; of cooperation. Mary’s “yes” enabled the salvific work of Christ. That’s how much God respects our autonomy. That’s how important humanity is.

Likewise, St. Paul says this in Colossians 1:24: “Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ’s afflictions for the sake of His body, that is, the Church.”

But what is Paul talking about? What could Christ possibly lack? Our participation; our assent; the uniting of our hearts — and our own suffering — with His.

Again, that’s how important humanity is.

So never underestimate the important role you have as a very special someone who cooperates with God. Sometimes, it’s a role that might seem a bit overwhelming. But whenever we are discouraged, we need only to look to the example of Mary — and not just during her month of May, but throughout our lives.

As Franciscans, our love for Mary follows that of St. Francis: “He loved with an unspeakable affection the Mother of the Lord Jesus Christ, forasmuch as that she had made the Lord of glory our Brother, and that through her we have obtained mercy” (St. Bonaventure, *Legenda Maior*, IX, 3).

Remember — on May 22, our very own Br. Joseph will be ordained to the priesthood at the Franciscan University of Steubenville! Be sure to keep him in your daily prayers as he moves toward this momentous date.

RECAP OF LAST GATHERING

OPENING PRAYER

Joe Boyle offered an opening prayer:

Life can appear to be complicated at times and so can we. But the truth is that we need to cut through the complexities of life and realize that, from the perspective and Will of God, life is simple. It’s simple in that all we need to do is say “Yes” to Him every day, surrendering all to Him and trusting Him every step of the way. We must be diligent in responding to His promptings and grace, but we do not have to enter into the entire complicated world, figure it out and solve it. This is too much and is far better done by God. Seek to be a simple soul who trusts in the perfect wisdom of God and He will sort life out for you (*Saint Faustina Diary*)

PRESENTATION

Bill Richey, OFS gave a presentation on Pope Francis’ book *Let Us Dream*. The presentation focused on the three periods of suffering in his life, which Pope Francis described as COVIDs. For each period, one Tau member shared a similar experience.

1. **Illness** – He was very ill, and the doctors removed the upper right lobe of his lung. Two nurses at the hospital were very helpful to him, and Sister Maria Dolores Tortola visited him in silence, only saying, “You’re imitating Jesus.”

Veronica O’Donnell, OFS shared her experience working in a hospital.

2. **Living in Germany** – He moved to Germany in 1986 and experienced feelings of loneliness and non-belonging. Moving to a foreign land throws you off balance.

Valerye Milleson shared her experience moving to different areas due to her work.

3. **Living in Cordoba** – From 1990 – 1992, he lived in Cordoba, in a lockdown. He did not leave the house much. This gave him a greater capacity for prayer; he experienced temptation; and he did a great deal of reading. Living in a lockdown, you suffer a lot, but if you allow it to change you, you come out better.

Josh Goldberg, OFS shared his reflection of the lockdown.

To conclude his presentation, Bill read a poem.

ONGOING FORMATION

Kimberley Heatherington, OFS led Ongoing Formation, in the absence of Walter Gawlak, OFS. She provided highlights from the introduction and first chapter of *Clare of Assisi: A Heart Full of Love*:

- Early on, at the age of 18, Clare decided she wanted to live a penitential life like Francis. But she did not get to live the way she wanted because the Pope wanted the women penitents to be protected.
- Clare emphasized the Incarnation.
- Clare saw the world as good because God created it.
- The poverty of God is his willingness to die for us. Poverty for us is living in dependence on God.
- The Trinity is perfect love; a continual flow of love back and forth.

After the overview, the members were divided into five groups. Each group discussed the following questions.

1. How does God's love make a difference in your life?
2. How do you understand the Trinity as a community of love? Does the Trinity help shape your life in the everyday world?
3. What is significant about the poverty of God for you? Do you relate the poverty of God as love to the person of Jesus Christ?
4. How does God's love diffuse through you to others?




